
We are stronger when we share resources, knowledge, and a sense of purpose. Our work reflects our commitment to nurturing a greener and better future for all.

## **COLLECTIVE IMPACT REPORT**

### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

This report is being published at a time of intensifying climate and humanitarian crises. Canada is falling short on commitments adopted under the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, standards in the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, and other international agreements intended to combat injustice and environmental degradation. The need for coordinated action is urgent but progress is slow and too easily undermined.

And yet, within our communities, there are individuals, organizations, and local governments that are working together to accelerate change. They are planting new forests in their cities, transforming streets into safe places for children, and retrofitting social housing to net zero. ## about our NATIONAL PROGRAMS



## **GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE**

The Living Cities Canada Fund enables community-based organizations, Indigenous governments, and municipalities to grow support for green infrastructure and engage citizens in the planning, design, and implementation of local green infrastructure action projects.

LIVING Canada

The National Mini Forest program transforms under-natured sites into thriving urban forests using an innovative tree-planting method. This program contributes to Canada's goal to plant 2 Billion Trees by 2030 to address climate change and biodiversity loss.





## SUSTAINABLE MOBILITY

The National Active School Streets Initiative creates car-free zones in front of schools at the start and end of the day. These playful spaces reduce emissions, alleviate traffic congestion, improve safety, create community connection, and increase rates of active travel for children.



The Canadian Electric School Bus Alliance aims to electrify all 51,000 school buses across Canada by 2040. This program seeks policy commitments at all levels of government to accelerate the transition to healthier and more sustainable student transportation.





## ENERGY EFFICIENCY

The Deep Energy Retrofits Canada program builds the capacity of homeowners, tenants, and industry professionals to accelerate deep home energy retrofits. This program contributes to Canada's greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions goal of net-zero by 2050.

Deep Energy Retrofits CANADA

Through our EnerGuide Service Organization, we provide organizations from across the country with technical training resources and tools that build critical capacity for energy advisors and other trades professionals. This includes our newly launched Heat Pump Right-Sizing service.





### **VOICES FOR ACTION**

Launched in early 2025, Voices for Action is a series of events that bring together people with diverse lived experiences and professional expertise who are advancing transformative, equitable, and sustainable change in Canadian communities.

The goal of these events is to share knowledge, resources, ideas, and to connect practitioners across Canada, creating a national network of innovation and collaboration that elevates our collective impact.

homes need to be retrofitted to achieve Net Zero Emissions. To achieve widespread and equitable change, communities require skilled tradespersons, trained EnerGuide advisors, and financial supports to ensure that households experiencing energy poverty are not left behind.

In 2024, our members delivered 10,750 EnerGuide Audits across Ontario. Completed retrofits resulted in a reduction of

50,032,720 kg

in fossil fuel emissions per year! However, only

5%

of retrofits reduced energy usage by 50 per cent or more. We need greater incentives and supports for Deep Energy Retrofits. An EnerGuide Energy Advisor from Goldfinch Energy (Toronto, ON)



6 out of 10 homeowners participating in the Canada Greener Homes Grant program installed a heat pump. However, half of the heat pumps installed in 2024 were undersized. That means that homeowners must continue to rely on fossil fuels. In 2025, Green Communities Canada launched a new Heat Pump Right-Sizing service and we are now working with contractors across the country to level up the industry and ensure maximum efficiency.



## energy retrofit **SPOTLIGHT**.

EnviroCentre's
Retrofit Accelerator (Ottawa, ON)



EnviroCentre's Retrofit Accelerator is helping affordable housing providers in Eastern Ontario transform their homes with deep energy-saving upgrades. They're working to reduce energy use in social housing by 50 per cent and greenhouse gas emissions by 80 per cent, all while keeping retrofit costs under \$30,000 per unit. By setting these high targets, they demonstrate that significant energy savings and emissions reductions can be achieved—without displacing tenants. This initiative is about more than buildings; it's about improving lives and fostering a healthier, greener future for everyone.

## SUSTAINABLE MOBILITY

Only 21 per cent of Canadian children walk or wheel to and from school. Driving contributes to increased traffic volumes on residential streets, poor air quality, fewer opportunities for physical activity, and unsafe environments in school zones.

In 2024, our members coordinated programs that increased active transportation to school. Participants walked or biked





## waste reduction SPOTLIGHT

Green Action Centre's
First Nations Waste Minimization Program (Manitoba)



Green Action Centre's First Nations Waste Minimization Program assists remote, winter-road First Nation communities to remove stewardship and non-stewardship material in Manitoba. 2025 marks the 6th year of Green Action Centre involvement in back-hauling materials from participating First Nations. In total, 26 semi-trailer loads of material were removed from 7 communities! This program also includes in-community education workshops and support for waste management planning. This ensures that sensitive northern ecosystems are protected from the dangers posed by hazardous waste seeping into the ground, lakes, and rivers.



## growing INFRASTRUCTURE

Communities are already experiencing the impacts of climate change. Our green infrastructure programs address key risks, reduce local vulnerabilities, and help cities adapt. Projects include Mini Forests, tree planting, depaving, rain gardens, food gardens, Indigenous medicine gardens, and shoreline restorations.

In 2024, our members and the Living Cities Canada Fund project partners, restored

## communities TRANSFORMED

In 2023, Green Communities Canada launched the Transform Stream of the Living Cities Canada Fund. This provided organizations with the funding and supports to develop large-scale, equity-embedded green infrastructure projects in neighbourhoods with the greatest environmental and social need. In 2024, 2,500 sq.m. of under-natured urban areas were transformed into biodiverse greenspaces that increase climate resiliency and community wellbeing.

## community orchard **SPOTLIGHT**

GreenUP's
One City Project (Peterborough, ON)

One City Peterborough is an organization dedicated to supporting those who have experienced homelessness, marginalization, or criminalization. Guided by the structured Transform Stream of the Living Cities Canada Fund, GreenUP led One City in a robust engagement and co-design process to bring the community's priorities and goals into focus. This process engaged staff, volunteers, and guests to create a more accessible and welcoming space for the community. The plan included planting a community orchard and rain garden boxes, enhancing stormwater management and food security, and creating shaded areas.

## food & medicine garden **SPOTLIGHT**



RainscapeTO's
Humber River Lodge (Toronto, ON)

Humber River Lodge, known as the Memtigwaake Kinomaage Maawnjiding, supports the urban Indigenous community in reclaiming land for cultural practices. This project, led by RainscapeTO, engaged 148 volunteers and community members. Together, they cleared out invasive species and restored the local ecology by planting native flora for food and medicine. The project included cultural ceremonies and concluded with a community dinner. Long-term site care will be managed by local volunteers and the Memtigwaake Kinomaage Maawnjiding Advisory Circle, ensuring sustainability through native species suited to the area.



London Environment Network's Nonprofit Resiliency Project (London, ON)



The Nonprofit Resiliency Project (NRP) supports local non-profit organizations that are at risk of being left behind in Canada's transition to an electrified economy. These organizations, many of which provide housing accommodations for low-income and vulnerable groups, often face barriers to accessing retrofit supports and funding for their unique building types. The NRP works with clients to implement sustainable upgrades across multi-unit residential buildings to transform them into more efficient, comfortable, and resilient spaces. In 2024, Community Living London partnered on a major retrofit toward Net Zero!



### **CLIMATE JUSTICE**

Climate justice is the greatest human rights challenge of our time. It affects rights to health, food, water, and housing, as well as Indigenous rights. The non-profit sector should be an inclusive movement for change. This starts from within, by ensuring we reflect the experience and knowledge of groups and communities most affected by the climate crisis.

This included the development of individual board-approved EDI strategies, group training, and collective accountability monitoring. Green Communities Canada provided support throughout this project, including regular workshops and coaching, the facilitation of peer-to-peer learning, and the development of a supportive resource library.
